The Community

Champaign Central is a school within Unit School District #4, located in Champaign, Illinois. The population of permanent residents in Champaign, Urbana, and Savoy is approximately 130,000. According to the 2010 Census, 93.3% of adults in the community have graduated from high school, and 51.4% are college graduates. Champaign-Urbana is the home of the University of Illinois, a public university which serves over 43,000 students a year from 50 states and 100 nations, and Parkland College, serving over 18,000 students annually in the third largest community college district in Illinois. Large employers in the area include those in education, health care, manufacturing, service, computer technology, and agriculture.

Champaign Central High School

Central High School is a four-year, comprehensive high school that represents a true snapshot of a diverse community, not only in actual demographics, but also around talents in academics, the arts, civic engagement, and athletics. Our vision is to ensure each student embraces a culture of thinking and learning in order to develop the prerequisite knowledge, skills and habits of mind to excel in the future. Central serves approximately 1,300 students. Central is classified as a high-poverty school, with 47.9% of all students receiving free/reduced lunch. Central has a mobility rate of 20%. 44.2% of the student body is Caucasian; 26.6% is African American; 14.8% is Hispanic; 8.1% is Asian; 5.7% is Two or More Races; 0.5% is American Indian; and 0.2% is Pacific Islander.

Faculty and Counseling Services

Central boasts a faculty of 113 members, 54% of whom have a master's degree or higher. CCHS has a student services staff composed of counselors, assistant principals, social workers, an attendance specialist, and a school psychologist.

Curriculum

The school day is composed of eight 50-minute periods. CCHS provides a broad range of offerings at several ability levels, including AP courses as well as courses for students with disabilities.

Class Rank

Students at CCHS are graded on a scale of A, B, C, D and F. Class rank is computed at the end of each semester and includes all courses except PE and safety. Class rank is computed according to a system of weighted honor points and reflects the number of courses taken, academic achievement, and relative demands of the course.

Grade Point Average

Since the 2009/2010 school year, student grade point averages are computed on a 4.0 scale with a +/- system.

Course Levels

Students are enrolled in courses on the basis of achievement, teachers' recommendations, parent requests, and test scores.

Academic

Courses planned for students working toward attainment of basic skills or who have attained basic skills and who are working toward higher competencies. Many of these students test average as a whole and go on to college. All heterogeneously grouped classes are placed in this category.

Honors (*) Courses planned for students working at higher conceptual levels or accelerated pace. This category includes Advanced Placement courses.

COVID-19 StatementFor the 2019 - 2020 academic school year:

- Per governor mandate, all Illinois schools closed. Champaign Central High School ceased in-person instruction on Monday, March 23 of 2020 and transitioned to remote learning on Monday, April 6 of 2020.
- On Tuesday, April 7 of 2020, Champaign Unit 4 School District transitioned to remote learning for the remainder of the school year.
- Our remote learning days were divided between "A" Days (even number periods) and "B" Days (odd number periods).
- Each of our students was issued a chromebook during remote learning.
- For grading purposes, all coursework was to be completed online and coursework could only improve a student's grade (per Illinois State Board of Education).
- Each student received a final semester letter grade on their transcript.
- Finally, there was no SAT school day for the Class of 2021.

For the 2020 - 2021 academic school year:

- Champaign Central High School has continued remote learning tentatively through the first quarter.
- Our students are asked to be in attendance from 9:00 a.m. - 1:35 p.m. Monday - Friday and attend all eight 30 minute periods.
- Students are attending and are expected to contribute to each of their classes via Zoom or Google Meet.
- At the end of the fall semester of 2020, students will receive a final letter grade on their transcript.
